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Richard Egarr Conductor

Since 2019 Richard has been Principal Guest of the Residentie Orkest and Artistic Partner of the St Paul Chamber, He was Music Director (now Laureate) of the Philharmonia Baroque 2020-2024, Music Director of the Academy of Ancient Music 2005-2020, and Associate Artist with the Scottish Chamber 2011-2017. He straddles the worlds of historically-informed and modern symphonic performance and has conducted many leading symphony orchestras, notably the London Symphony, Royal Concertgebouw and Philadelphia orchestras. He made his Glyndebourne debut in 2007 and conducted opera cycles of Monteverdi, Purcell and Mozart with AAM at the Barbican; Handel oratorios lie at the heart of his repertoire.

In 2025/26, he conducts the Sao Paulo Symphony, Belgian National and NDR Radiophilharmonie, the latter in Bach's St John's Passion with the NDR Vokalensemble. He also leads the Chicago Baroque, Orchestra of the Eighteenth Century and tours the Netherlands with Netherlands Bach Society in Bach's B minor Mass. Highlights this season with the Residentie Orkest include the Brahms Violin concerto with Bomsori Kim, and with the St Paul Chamber a programme of John Adams and George Butterworth sung by Roderick Williams.

As half of Duo Pleyel, Egarr regularly plays four-hands repertoire with his wife Alexandra Nepomnyashchaya; they have released 4 acclaimed albums on Linn -Mozart/JC Bach, Dussek, Schubert and a compilation of Yuletide favourites - with a project to record all Beethoven Symphonies in arrangements by Czerny for the composer's anniversary year in 2027. Egarr is noted for his many solo harpsichord recitals over the years, notably at the Wigmore Hall and Carnegie Hall.

Egarr's extensive discography includes solo keyboard works by Byrd and Sweelinck on Linn, and by Bach, Handel, Mozart and Couperin on Harmonia Mundi, His long list of recordings with the Academy of Ancient Music includes several award-winning Handel discs (2007 Gramophone Award, 2009 MIDEM and Edison awards) and both JS Bach's Passions. His world premiere recording on AAM Records of Dussek's Messe Solemnelle won the Gramophone Best Choral Recording 2021.

Egarr trained as a choirboy at York Minster, at Chetham's School of Music in Manchester, and as organ scholar at Clare College Cambridge. His studies with Gustav and Marie Leonhardt further inspired his work in the field of historical performance. He taught for many years at the Amsterdam Conservatoire and was Visiting Professor at the Juilliard School for over 10 years.

Joel Bardolet Guest Leader

Joel Bardolet, a distinguished violinist from Vigo, has earned recognition across Europe for his innovative interpretations, emotional depth, and refined technique. A sought-after concertmaster and soloist, he is admired for creating immersive performances shaped by rhythmic precision, intention, and openness.

His early passion for the violin led to studies in Catalonia, Germany, and Switzerland with renowned mentors, giving him a rich understanding of varied musical traditions. This diversity informs his work, from classical repertoire to contemporary premieres. He has appeared as soloist with the Vienna Chamber Orchestra, Orchestre de Chamber de Lausanne, Scottish Chamber Orchestra, and Basel Chamber Orchestra, receiving acclaim for interpretations of Bach, Beethoven, and Brahms.

Bardolet is equally dedicated to modern music, collaborating with living composers to expand the violin's expressive possibilities. His performances of new works display the same rigor and passion as his classical interpretations.

Committed to education, he regularly offers masterclasses and workshops, encouraging young musicians to develop their own artistic voices. His influence thus extends beyond the concert stage, shaping the next generation.

A highlight of his career is his presence at Denmark's Klassisk Sommer Festival, where his technically brilliant and emotionally charged performances are highly anticipated. He is also a founding member of the Fortuny Trio, alongside cellist Pau Codina and pianist Marc Heredia. The ensemble is praised for its unity and breadth of repertoire, spanning masterworks to contemporary compositions.

Through performance, collaboration, and teaching, Joel Bardolet continues to make a significant impact on the classical music world, bringing passion, versatility, and a distinctive artistic voice to audiences and fellow musicians alike

Deirdre McKay Composer

Originally from rural County Down, Deirdre McKay's music has been widely performed at leading venues including London's Southbank Centre and Wigmore Hall, The Phillips Collection in Washington, Amsterdam's Muziekgebouw, Orléans Concours International, Gothenburg International Chamber Music Festival, National Sawdust in Brooklyn, Dublin's National Concert Hall, and New York's Symphony Space and Carnegie Hall.

Her distinctive voice has earned numerous accolades, including a Director's Choice Award from Boston Metro Opera's International Composers' Competition, the Arts Council of Northern Ireland's Major Individual Artist Award, and the prestigious Paul Hamlyn Foundation Award for Composers in 2018. In 2023, her work represented Ireland at the ISCM World New Music Days in Cape Town.

Recent performances include Ash, commissioned by the Dublin International Piano Competition and performed by Danny Driver at Oxford's Smorgaschord Festival; Litany to the Magdalene Dead, commissioned and premiered by Deirdre Brenner with Lotte Betts-Dean at the West Cork Chamber Music Festival; and The Owl, a setting of Seamus Heaney for The Fidelio Trio and Daire Halpin, commissioned by GlasDrum.

Deirdre's music has been commissioned and performed by Northern Ireland Opera, State Choir Latvija, BBC Singers, Chamber Choir Ireland, Irish Chamber Orchestra, Ulster Orchestra, and the Crash Ensemble, among many others. Her collaborators include internationally renowned soloists and ensembles across Europe and North America.

She studied at Queen's University Belfast and the University of Manchester, supported by a British Academy Award, completing her doctorate with Piers Hellawell, and later studying privately with Kevin Volans. Her music has featured in films by Des Bell, and is available on the Métier, Lorelt, Diatribe, and RTÉ Lyric FM labels, with broadcasts by BBC Radio Deutschlandradio Kultur, WNYC, and WQXR.

Programme Notes

Deirdre McKay (b.1972)

Meltwater

The desolate beauty of our planet's most extreme and inhospitable landscapes, like a winter freeze, took captivity of this piece. In turn, it answers to the invocation of the ice world, as pared and fragile as its pulsing meltwater edge: diaphanous shards, floating, in its cathedral spaces.

Meltwater was commissioned by the Irish Chamber Orchestra, with the support of the Arts Council of Ireland, An Chomhairle Ealaíon, and premiered by the orchestra in 2009, conducted by Jaime Martín.

George Friedrich Handel (1685-1759)

Water Music

Handel's Water Music is a bristling, bright Baroque masterpiece filled with brilliant colours and extravagant sounds that never fails to evoke a sense of occasion. It was commissioned in 1717 by King George I to accompany a mid-summer pageant along the River Thames, for which Handel assembled some 50 musicians to accompany the royal barge and provide an opulent soundtrack for the occasion.

When finally published in 1741, Water Music comprised some 20 or so pieces, several of which had been written before and after the lavish event from which it takes its title. Traditionally, they are performed as

three Suites – each with its own contrasting character – although Handel didn't insist on a particular order so that individual movements can be played in any sequence.

Handel lit upon using popular lively dance forms for the festive occasion, interspersed with slower airs and interludes, no doubt to give his musicians an opportunity to catch their breath. With flutes, recorders, oboes, bassoons, trumpets, strings, and continuo to the fore, the rich orchestral forces combine moments of lavish grandeur, effusive joy and exquisite lyricism to conjure the majesty of the occasion even as the music's buoyant rhythms and flowing melodies evoke the river-borne setting.

Providing the grandest of curtain-raisers, Water Music begins with the Suite in F major, its nine movements making it the longest of the three. It is also the most diverse in its shifts of tempo and mood, perhaps to emulate the ebb-and-flow of the tidal river. Featuring the first use of horns in English orchestral music – they're not in every movement but you'll notice them when they do appear – it is suitably festive, stately and radiant. Listen out for moments of inventive variety, too, notably in the elegant song-like 'Air' at the Suite's mid-point and the double-time rhythmic vitality of the 'Bourrée' soon after



High ceremony is the order of the day in the fivepart Suite in D major, where horns return to share centerstage with trumpets to strike a distinctly majestic and martial tone. It also boasts the exuberant 'Alla Hornpipe' – a blaze of exultant strings and effervescent brass in animated dialogue. After which, the concluding 'Minuet' offers a much-needed moment of recovery and repose, its sedate poise laced with bird-like woodwinds, reedy horns and burnished brass.

Across its four movements, the Suite in G major is an artful exercise in what we might call "winding down". You can immediately hear that it is cast in a more intimate mood with the lighter textures of airy flutes and recorders and graceful strings setting the tone. The dance element is still prominent, but the style is now more genteel and French-sounding. One last burst of energy comes in the flourish of the concluding 'Gigue' with its striking echoes of the Irish jig.

So pleased was George I with what he heard, that he insisted on Water Music being repeated three times. Handel would go on to write the equally famous and spectacular Music for the Royal Fireworks for another royal jamboree for George II in 1749.
